Unpacking Summer A Message from our Executive Director

Before summer started, a young teen asked me: *Who could ever replace Sylvie?* (This was said with an anxious tone implying that CBC would be in trouble without our former Camp Director). And then he added: *Thank goodness Mike's back.* As I reflect on the past year, I am celebrating the new and the old. I am happy to report that change and tradition have joined hands and CBC continues to thrive as a place of strength and support for our campers and families.

One reason to celebrate was the hiring of our new Camp Director, Matt Cornish. Conducting a national search with the search committee, we hired Matt, an experienced camp professional from Connecticut who moved here with his wife, Melissa, and their baby Imogen. Arriving in February, the coldest time of the year in Maine, he immediately jumped into the thick of it – finalizing the summer camp program before registration opened in March; hiring 65 summer staff; and running programs in the spring to keep our partnership with the local school system strong.

Included in this newsletter is also the celebration of having camp artist extraordinaire Mike Duffy working here as the Arts Program Head for twenty years. All successful camps have long-standing traditions, and nobody does it better than Mike in offering the campers the highly



sought after camper bucks and staff cards, Ecky the friendly waterfront dragon, and the secret elevator that will convey only the luckiest of campers up the waterfront hill.

When I consider what makes a camp great, I know that one of the keys to our success is our staff and the volunteers who are all committed to giving every camper a great summer experience. When you look at our financial page, you'll see that 73% of CBC's personnel expenses go to staffing our programs. Hiring and training young people (and Mike Duffy!) are the backbone of CBC's programs. Because of your investment in CBC, we had a great camp season. Matt, Mike, and so many other committed staff helped to make this happen and you will see pictures and articles throughout this newsletter that scream a fun and wonderful SUMMER CAMP!

I saw a dad at The Grand the other night who said that his son cannot wait until next summer to return to CBC. Camp is an important part of many children's lives and can make a huge difference when returning to school, negotiating peer groups, and finding him or herself in this crazy world. As the staff stood together at the end of our first week of camp this summer, one of the counselors asked "Well, Matt, how are you

feeling after your first week at CBC?" My response was simply, "there's nowhere else I'd rather be." Nine more weeks of summer camp, and a few months later, and that sentiment is as true now as it was in June. Camp Beech Cliff has cast its spell upon me thanks to the amazing team of staff I had the honor of working with this summer, and most importantly thanks to you: the families that are the life of this singularly amazing place and the surrounding community.

In fact, that's the thing that made me want to join the CBC family in the first place. When I had the chance to visit and hear of the relationship that exists between Camp Beech Cliff and the greater MDI community, I was hooked. According to my wife, Melissa, I came home with a new energy she hadn't seen before. I knew this was a relationship I wanted to be a part of.

In a way, that's why the work and mission of CBC is so important. It is a place that serves as a blue print for what "community" can be. We strive to be a laboratory where our campers and staff are welcome to come as

Today's campers will set the tone for the future development of our communities. That is one of the many reasons "there's nowhere else I'd rather be."

Teaching the Lost Art of Self-Reliance

Stopping by the yurt this summer, one would encounter any number of different projects that harkened back to a simpler time. Whether using a recycled water bottle, plastic straw, and a balloon to create a working thermometer, or combing out raw wool to be used in felting, our campers experienced a taste of what it was like to do things the old-fashioned way: with their own two hands.

One highlight of DIY was a week focused on food. Each day Lightning and Quasar campers took on a different aspect of a meal they would create together by hand. The campers utilized heavy cream and mason jars to shake their way to delicious homemade butter, baked bread over an open fire, and even carved their own butter knives from wood found on our camp grounds. In the end, not only did they get to feast upon the fruit of their labors, but they also had a new sense of the energy that goes into creating the things we eat and the tools we use to do so.

Another camper favorite was the addition of a flock of 12 chickens, and small camp garden. While the joy of throwing a handful of scratch and watching 12 birds converge on it was a highlight, our chickens gave our

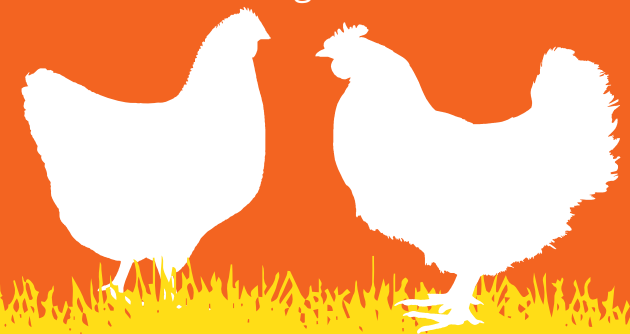

campers something more: a sense of where the food we eat comes from. Whether tending to the tomato plants, or collecting eggs, our campers gained firsthand knowledge of the energy and resources that go into putting food on the table. A valuable lesson as we at CBC, and beyond, seek to lessen the impact we have on the planet, while providing for its people.

Why DIY, though? Studies (and now our own experiences at CBC) have shown that hands-on projects have many benefits: physical benefits like hand-and-eye coordination and fine motor control; cognitive benefits like creativity and inventiveness; aesthetic benefits like the smell and feel of leather, wood, and other natural mediums; and perhaps most importantly, emotional and social benefits like competence, confidence, and respect for oneself, others, and the materials and resources at our disposal.

As we look towards 2019, we'll work to build upon the solid foundation of 2018 as we seek to expand the hands-on opportunities for our campers. Make sure you stop by the yurt next summer and get in on the Do-It-Yourself action!

Mike Duffy just finished his 20th year as a CBC staff member. He has taught a generation of MDI campers to love and appreciate arts and crafts. We couldn't think of a better celebration of his impact at camp than provided by this camper...

“ I am looking down at it in shock. Even now, as I'm holding it, even though I'm almost fourteen, I am reminded of its magic. It is just a piece of paper, but, to me and thousands of other campers, it is priceless. It is a Camp Beech Cliff camper buck and this particular one is the most special one of all. To a kid, Mount Desert Island is magical, with its beautiful landscapes and its fresh, cool water. However, of all the magical spots on MDI, CBC is the most magical place of all. Imagine being eight years old and fake scuba diving at the bottom of the lake for parts of a sunken ship or playing soccer for hours and hours on a field that seemed to go on forever. Now, imagine being eight and having a counselor give you a crisp new blue, red, or orange bill that you can use to buy duct tape wallets or ice pops. We had to earn them, of course. We all ran around and picked up twenty pieces of trash or carried the younger campers' heavy backpacks up the infinitely steep hill from the waterfront, just for the feel of the camperbuck against our fingers. For six years, I ran my butt off to earn as many as I could, and, to this day, I am glad I did. The 1999 camperbuck is the oldest of the old and the rarest of the rare. I still can't believe I have it. All the magic it has is because of its creator, the counselor who is depicted on it, Mike Duffy. ”

A Message from our Director of Development

Growing up, camp was one of the most important inflection points in my life. I couldn't wait for summer, to see camp friends, my favorite counselors, and try that one challenge

I didn't quite master the previous year. At age 17, I was a junior counselor, and the next year, a senior counselor. Even though I haven't been back to my camp in years, the experiences shared with campers and fellow staff stay with me to this day.

Before moving to MDI from New York City, my daughter Cece attended CBC for two full summers. The friends she made, and the confidence gained at camp eased our transition to full-time MDI residents. I grew to understand CBC not just as a summer camp, but as a critical resource that allows local residents to work long hours in the summer, provides a place for local and away kids to

connect with nature and each other, and is an off season recreational facility serving downeast Maine.

In January 2018, I was honored to formally join the CBC family as Director of Development. Hitting the ground running in my new role has been made easier by the large foundation of support from the CBC community of camper families, camper and staff alumni, current and former Board members, local businesses, and local and seasonal Hancock County residents.

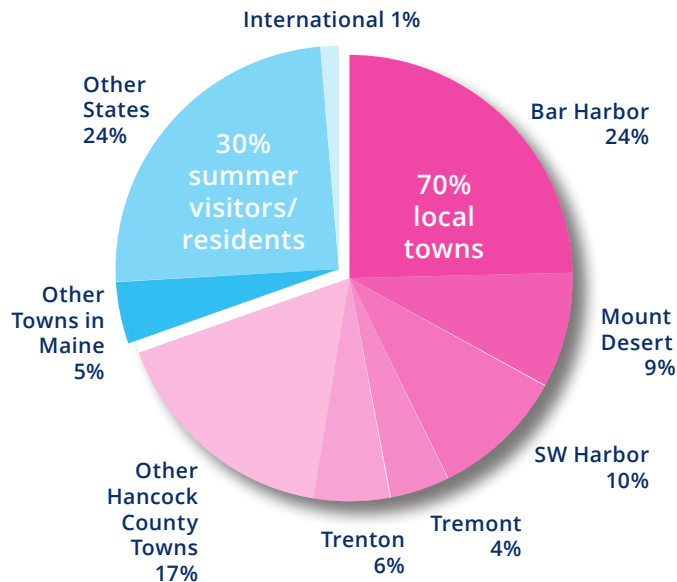

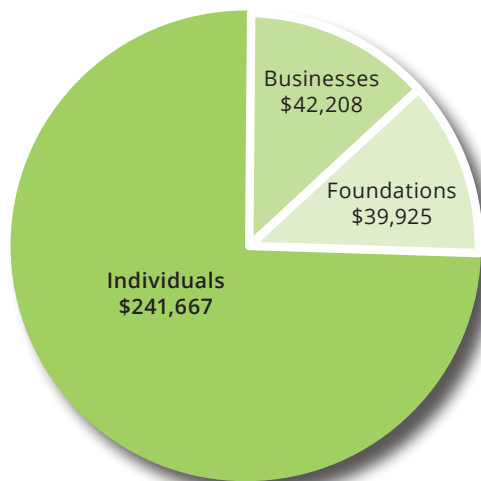

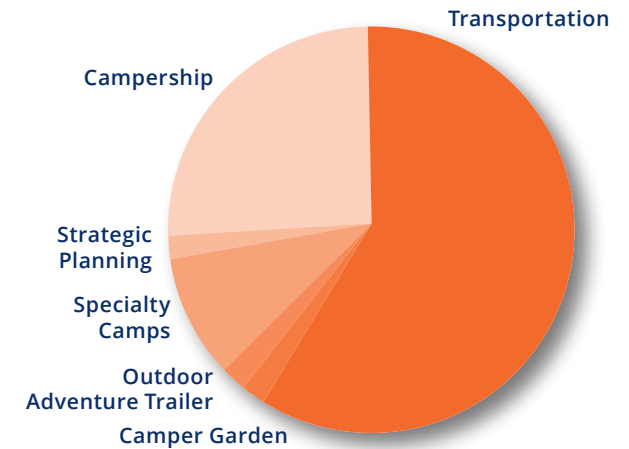
